# A Word from our Health Specialists

Please remember we must have prescriptions for all medications for residents. We understand a resident may ask you to get them cough drops, medicated powder, or something for stomach trouble; please do refer them to speak with Suzette or any of the Health Services staff to help them. While these may seem innocuous, they may interfere with medications and treatments that you are not aware of and can cause harm to the resident.

If you accompany your resident to an appointment, please let us know so that we can print out information for the doctor to have. We utilize a communication system with medical personnel to help better care for residents. We ask that you then give any after-visit information to the Health Services office so that we can update our records.

All medication changes should be sent directly to our pharmacy Health Direct in Williston. Local doctors are familiar with this pharmacy. If you utilize Kinney Drugs (or any other pharmacy) the resident/family is responsible for getting it to the building. Health Direct will deliver after hours even in the case of late day appointments.

If you've not yet met Suzette or Dorothy, please stop in the office during the day to introduce yourself, we've also brought on a night nurse Lydia who works after hours to continue the high quality of care we provide.
